What's a social story?

A social story explains a concept, situation or skill in an accessible way.

It's a written narrative that can help the reader prepare for a new situation or safely explore a new concept.

Social stories were originally designed for children with autism, but they can be helpful for lots of children, including younger children and those with additional needs.

How do I use this resource?


This social story is designed to help your child feel more comfortable using their radio aid at school or nursery, in extracurricular clubs or in family life. It may be helpful if your child is new to using a radio aid, will be using it in a new way, or if they are reluctant to use one.

You can adapt this resource to suit your child. Select the sections and parts that are most relevant to them. On some pages, you can add extra information or select an option to make it personal to them.

You can help your child fill in the information on the pink lines. The **blue text** shows where you have different options to suit your child - delete as appropriate.

This resource does not cover every situation where a child or young person might use a radio aid. The resource is also available as an editable Word document if you and your child want to write your own scenarios. Encourage your child to think about times where they might need more support to use their radio aid, and to come up with their own solutions.

They will keep it safe until I use it again.




If there is a problem with my radio aid

A grown-up is wearing my radio aid.


I cannot hear their voice.

I put my hand up to ask for help.



I can ask a grown-up questions like:

- Can you make sure my radio aid is switched on?
- Is my radio aid charged?
- Is my radio aid connected to my (technology)?
- Is there a problem with my (technology)?



Talking about my radio aid

Other children stare at my radio aid.

They ask questions about it.

They might not have seen a radio aid before.

They might not know that I am deaf / I have hearing loss (delete as appropriate).



I can:

- explain that my radio aid helps me to hear
- ask a grown-up to tell other children about my radio aid
- show them how my radio aid works.




Sometimes, it gets very noisy in my classroom.

I cannot see my teacher's face.


I cannot hear my teacher.

I can hear my teacher's voice!




I am working with my friends.

Everyone is talking.


The classroom is noisy.

Using my radio aid on school trips


My class is going on a trip.

We leave the school and go on a bus.

The new place is very noisy.

My teacher is talking to us. I cannot hear what they are saying.


Other grown-ups talk to us. I cannot hear what they are saying.



My teacher uses my radio aid.

They give the transmitter to other grown-ups when they talk.


I can hear what they are saying!



Using my radio aid out and about

I am walking outside with (grown-up). There are noisy cars. There are loud noises.(grown-up) tells me things I need to do to keep safe.

It is hard to hear what they are saying.



..... (grown-up) has my radio aid.
They wear it around their neck / they wear a microphone on their clothes / they hold the microphone (delete as appropriate).

They help me connect the radio aid to my (technology).

I can hear them clearly.



Using my radio aid at home

I like watching videos and listening to music.

Sometimes I cannot hear the sound well. I turn up the volume.

My family say it is too loud! They turn the volume down.


I cannot hear the sound properly.



A grown-up connects the transmitter to my **television / tablet /** music player (delete as appropriate).

They help connect it to my (technology).

I can hear the sound clearly!



Using my radio aid in the car

I am sitting in the car. (grown-up) is driving the car. The car is noisy. I cannot see (grown-up)'s face.

It is hard to hear what they are saying.

Using my radio aid at clubs

I love going to my club after school / at the weekend / in the school holidays (delete as appropriate).




Sometimes it is noisy at my club.
